Program Overview

The C1-C2 curriculum represents the pinnacle of Spanish language learning, designed for students who have already achieved B2 proficiency and seek to attain near-native command of the language. At these levels, learners develop the ability to:

- Understand a wide variety of lengthy, demanding texts and recognize implicit meanings
- Express themselves fluently and spontaneously without apparent effort
- Use the language flexibly and effectively for social, academic, and professional purposes
- Produce clear, well-structured, detailed texts on complex subjects

C1 Level: Effective Operational Proficiency

At C1, learners can understand a wide variety of lengthy, demanding texts and recognize implicit meanings. They express themselves fluently and spontaneously without much obvious searching for expressions. They use language flexibly and effectively for social, academic, and professional purposes.

C2 Level: Mastery

At C2, learners can understand with ease virtually everything heard or read. They can summarize information from different spoken and written sources, reconstructing arguments and accounts in a coherent presentation. They express themselves spontaneously, very fluently and precisely, differentiating finer shades of meaning even in more complex situations.

2. C1 Level: Effective Operational Proficiency

The C1 level certifies sufficient linguistic competence to understand a wide variety of lengthy, somewhat demanding texts, as well as to grasp implicit meaning. Students at this level can express themselves fluently and spontaneously without apparent effort to find the right words.

Master the full range of Spanish verbal periphrasis to express nuances of meaning:

- **Beginning/Ending:** "echarse a", "ponerse a", "acabar de", "terminar por"
- **Gradual Progress:** "ir + gerund", "venir + gerund", "quedar en"
- **Obligation/Necessity:** "haber de", "tener que", "deber de" (nuanced differences)
- **Probability:** "deber de", "haber de", "ser de" + infinitive
- **Repetition:** "volver a", "estar por", "quedar por"

At C1 level, students must demonstrate the ability to understand complex texts from various sources:

Text Types

- Long, complex factual and literary texts
- Specialized articles outside one's field
- Contemporary literary prose
- Reports and essays with complex arguments
- Implicit meanings and attitudes in texts

Reading Strategies

- Identifying the writer's stance and attitude
- Recognizing rhetorical devices and stylistic choices
- Inferring meaning from context
- Understanding cohesive devices and text organization
- Critically evaluating arguments and evidence

3. C2 Level: Mastery

The C2 level represents the highest level of language proficiency, where learners can communicate with the fluency and precision of a highly competent native speaker. At this level, students demonstrate subtle control of nuances and can handle complex situations with ease.

3.1 Advanced Grammar

Refined Grammatical Control

At C2 level, students demonstrate complete mastery of Spanish grammar with the ability to use complex structures effortlessly:

Subtle Mood Distinctions

Understanding when indicative vs. subjunctive changes meaning: "Me alegra que viene" vs. "Me alegra que venga"

Advanced Pronoun Usage

Complex clitic combinations, leísmo/laismo/loismo awareness in different regions

Prepositional Nuances

Verbs with changing meanings based on preposition: "soñar con" vs. "soñar en"

Regional Variations

Understanding grammatical variations across Spanish-speaking regions

Complex Syntactic Structures

- **Cleft sentences:** "Lo que me preocupa es...", "Fue Juan quien..."
- **Dislocation:** "A Maria, la vi ayer", "Eso, no lo creo"
- **Embedding:** Multiple levels of subordination
- **Inversion:** Stylistic word order changes for emphasis
- **Ellipsis:** Omitting elements while maintaining clarity

Literary and Rhetorical Language

- **Irony:** Saying the opposite of what is meant
- **Alliteration and assonance:** Sound patterns in prose and poetry
- **Register shifts:** Moving between formal and informal within discourse

C2 learners must demonstrate the ability to:

- Understand with ease virtually all forms of written language
- Read abstract, structurally complex texts such as manuals, specialized articles, and literary works
- Appreciate stylistic distinctions and subtexts
- Recognize and interpret cultural references
- Critically evaluate the quality and reliability of information

3.4 Nuanced Communication

Precision in Expression

At C2 level, the focus shifts from merely communicating ideas to expressing them with precision and nuance:

- **Distinguishing shades of meaning:** Understanding subtle differences between synonyms
- **Appropriate register selection:** Choosing the exact level of formality required
- **Cultural appropriateness:** Knowing what expressions fit which contexts
- **Repair strategies:** Smoothly correcting oneself without disrupting communication
- **Backchanneling:** Using appropriate fillers and responses in conversation

DELE Exam Structure

The DELE (Diploma de Español como Lengua Extranjera) is the official Spanish language certification issued by the Instituto Cervantes on behalf of the Spanish Ministry of Education.

Assessment Criteria

Accuracy

Grammatical correctness, appropriate vocabulary choice, spelling

Fluency

Natural flow, appropriate pacing, smooth transitions

Coherence

Logical organization, clear connections between ideas

Appropriateness

Register, tone, and style suitable for context

Passing Requirements

- Minimum score of 60% overall
- Minimum score of 30 points in each group (C1)
- All sections must be passed in the same examination session
- Results available approximately three months after the exam
- Diploma valid for life with no expiration

Preparation Strategies

1. **Practice with authentic materials:** Use past exam papers and official preparation materials
2. **Time management:** Practice completing tasks within exam time limits
3. **Mock exams:** Take full practice tests under exam conditions
4. **Feedback:** Work with a teacher or tutor for detailed feedback
5. **Regular practice:** Maintain daily contact with the language
6. **Weakness identification:** Focus on areas that need improvement
